- Remote Learning Technology Survey for Spring 2020 Update
  - Survey disseminated to 14,980 spring enrolled students, of which more than 51% completed the survey.
  - One open-ended question asked was "What specific concerns or comments do you have regarding moving classes to remote learning for the remainder of the Spring 2020 semester at TCC? More than 22% had no concerns. Top concerns were technology access and learning/understanding.
- Fall Scheduling Update
  - Four options that will be utilized: online courses, online live, blended, and face-to-face.
- OSRHE COVID-19 Policy Guidance and Reporting Update
  - Guidance was received from the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

#### 1.1 Purchase of Glass Office Enclosures

Authorization was requested to contract with <u>Workspace Resource</u>, <u>Inc.</u> (<u>Tulsa</u>, <u>OK</u>) in the amount of \$208,979 for the purchase and installation of glass office enclosures for use in the Hardesty Student Success Center at West Campus. This purchase will be awarded under OU Contract R-16000-16, and will be funded from the capital budget.

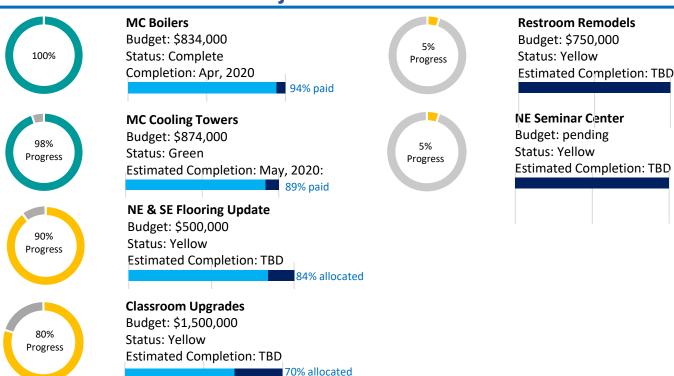

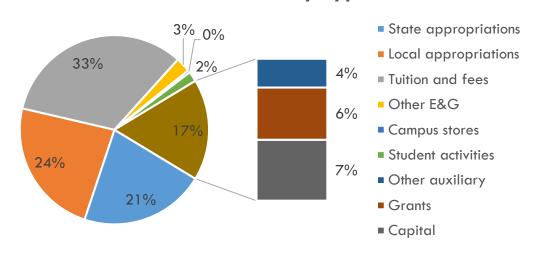

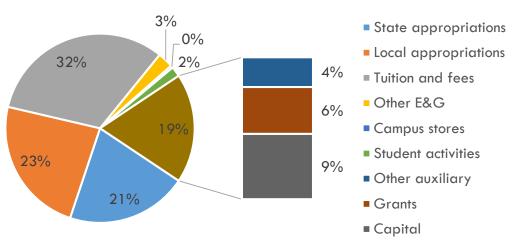

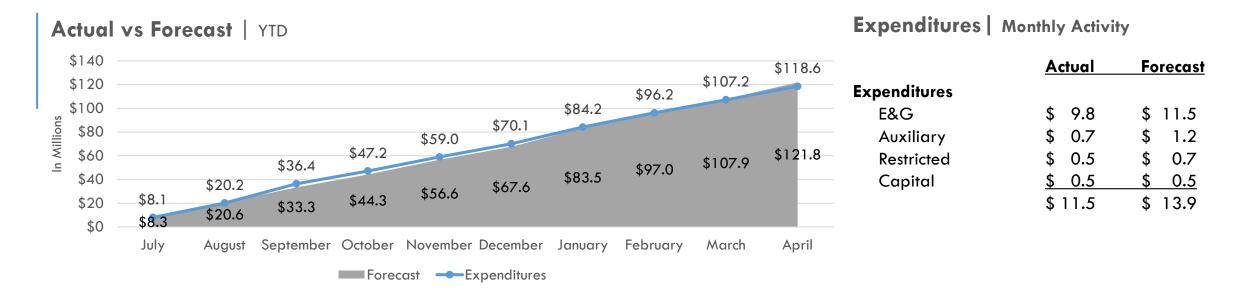
# **YTD Revenues by Type**



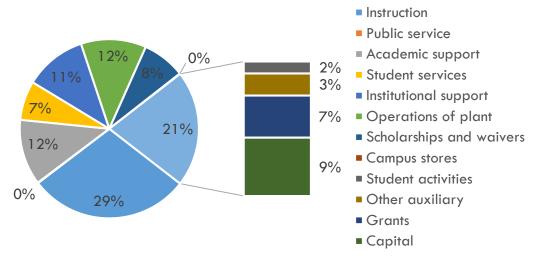
# YTD Forecasted Revenues by Type



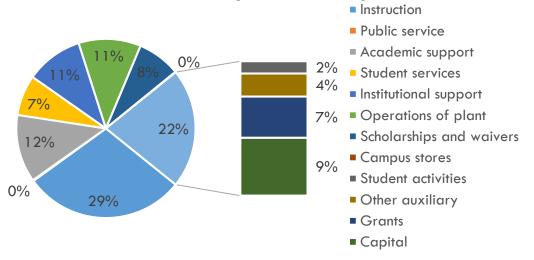
# **EXPENSE DASHBOARD APRIL 2020**



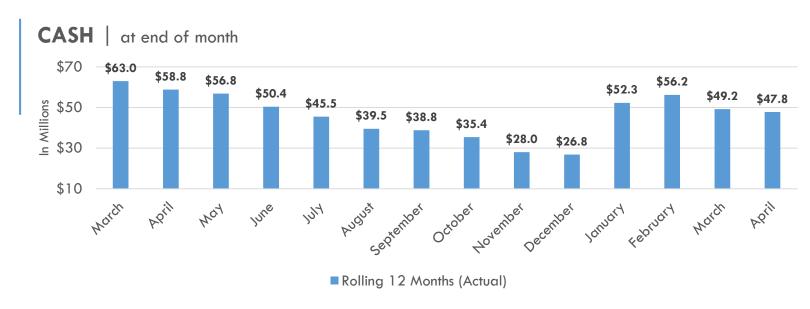




# YTD Forecasted Expenditures by Function

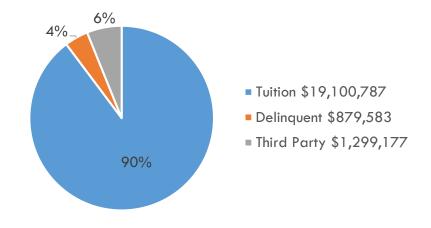

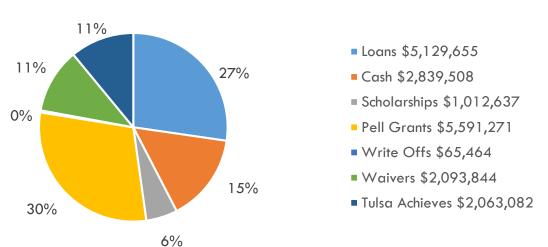
