FACILITIES & SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT

1. Overview of Committee Meeting Topics

Regent McKamey apprised the board of meeting topics discussed in the committee meeting on January 14.

• Major Projects Update

- Former Child Development Center (CDC) at West Campus is being remodeled into several allied health laboratories for the Cardiovascular Technology program and the Diagnostic Medical Sonography program. Completion by Fall 2021 semester is the goal.
- Reviewed proposed plan for the Metro Campus Student Success Center, which will be located in the academic building. Construction scheduled to begin this summer with opening by Spring 2022.
- Plans for the Northeast Campus Student Success Center also discussed with a similar construction timeline upon project approval.
- o Projects are dependent on budget availability.
- Year-end Safety Review
 - o COVID-19 activities and expenditures
 - Marketing materials and signage
 - Numerous updates to campus facility operations
- Michael Siftar gave an overview of the Major Projects Dashboard.
 - Northeast Campus mini-market is complete and open. It is located on the first floor of the student union and includes fresh food, a microwave space, and beverages. The cafeteria is closed. There are now two minimarkets in the academic building and the student union building.
 - Vendors toured the former CDC at West Campus.
 - Meeting with Student Affairs leadership to discuss and review the floorplan for the Metro Campus Student Success Center.
 - Accelerating conversations about how to fund deferred maintenance initiatives and evaluating priorities.
 - In reference to the handout, air handlers are replacements for the most part. The sprinkler system is an addition.

 - The CARES II Act budget increased by 50%.
 - Changes to Pell and FASFA to streamline the process favorable to applicants. Second Chance Pell reinstated for 2023-24.
 - AACC requesting additional stimulus dollars, job training initiatives, and adoption of the Dream Act.

State:

- Board of Equalization met and does not anticipate a revenue failure for this fiscal year due to federal stimulus dollars. Fiscal year 2022 currently unknown.
- House and Senate has started budget discussions.
- Tracking 110 bills that have been filed.
- The open meetings laws are up for legislative discussion and possible changes due to the pandemic.
- External Affairs
 - Enrollment strategies
- TCC Foundation Update
 - o Annual campaign: currently at \$233,000 of the \$275,000 goal

FINANCE, RISK AND AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT

Presented by Regent Cornell

1. Purchase Item Agreements over \$50,000

1.1 Software Licensing

Authorization was requested for software licensing agreements with Digital Architecture, Inc. (Lakeland, FL) in the amount of \$65,951. This amount includes Curriculog curriculum management software, Explorer transfer software, and Acalog academic catalog software. All three software programs are provided as annual licenses, which are not subject to competitive bidding. The purchases will be funded from general budget.

A **motion** was made by the Finance, Risk & Audit Committee to approve the purchase of software licensing. No second was needed. **Motion carried unanimously by voice vote.**

1.2 Computer Services

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Pinnacle Business Systems, Inc. (Edmond, OK) in the amount of \$70,884 to provide offsite data backup and storage services of enterprise data. As a service, this purchase

is not subject to competitive bidding. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

A motion was made by the Finance, Risk & Audit Committee to approve the purchase of computer services. No second was needed. Motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

1.3 Computer Services

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with True Digital Security, Inc. (Orlando, FL) in the amount of \$75,641 to provide network security and training services. As a service, this purchase is not subject to competitive bidding, but is being purchased under Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) OneNet contract C2020-3. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

A motion was made by the Finance, Risk & Audit Committee to approve the purchase of computer services. No second was needed. Motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

2. Monthly Financial Report for December 2020

Chief Financial Officer, Mark McMullen, presented an overview of October revenues, expenses, cash management and accounts receivables.

- Revenues: above budget due to better-than-expected enrollment numbers being offset by slow down of state appropriation receipts. Local appropriations remain strong. Will continue to monitor for next fiscal year.
- Expenses: trending below budget reflected in capital spend and auxiliary spend. E&G spend tracking on par.
- Cash and Accounts Receivable: reserves trending above requirement

The Finance, Risk & Audit Committee recommended approval of the monthly financial report for December 2020 as presented.

A motion was made by the Finance, Risk & Audit Committee to approve the monthly financial report for December 2020. No second was needed. Motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

Tulsa Community College is authorized by House Bill No. 1748 to establish or increase academic services fees at our institution with the approval of the College governing board and to recommend to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education such fees as long as the fees do not exceed the actual cost of the academic services provided by the institution.

Title 70, O. S. § 3218.10, authorizes governing boards of institutions within The State System to establish academic services fees at their respective institutions, with the approval of the State Regents, which may be required in addition to resident and nonresident tuition and mandatory fees. Such fees shall not exceed the actual costs of the academic services provided by the institution and may include, but shall not be limited to, special instruction, testing, and provision of laboratory supplies and materials. It is the intent of the Legislature that the State Regents maintain information on established mandatory fees authorized in Title 70, O. S§ 3218.8 and 3218.9 and on the academic services fees authorized in this section. The information shall include, but shall not be limited to, the basis for the amount of the fee, the amount of total revenue to be Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education 56 collected from the fee, and the use of the revenue collected.

The following words or terms, shall have the following meaning, unless the concept clearly indicates otherwise.

- 1. Fees. Those fees assessed students in addition to resident and nonresident tuition as a condition of enrollment.
 - a. Academic Services Fees-Fees assessed certain students as a condition of enrollment and as a condition of academic recognition for completion of prescribed courses. Such fees are assessed students receiving certain courses of instruction or certain academic services as designated by the institution and shall not exceed the actual costs of the course of instruction or the academic services provided by the institution. These Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education 57 services may include, but shall not be limited to, special instruction, testing, and provision of laboratory supplies and materials.

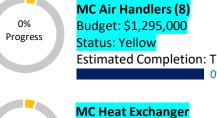

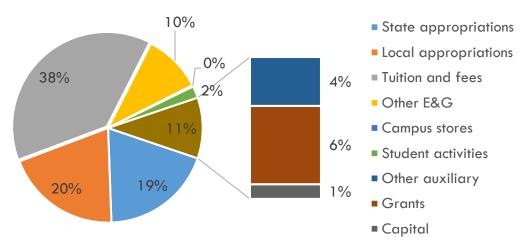

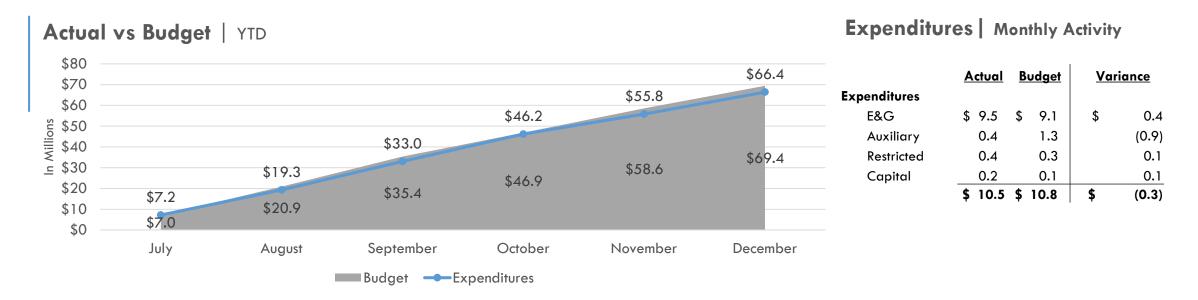

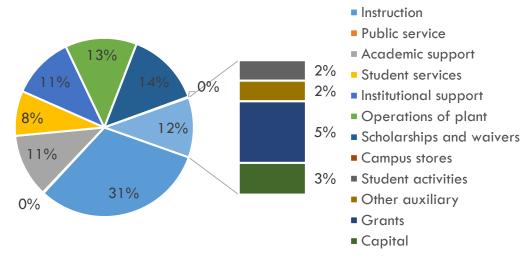
YTD Budgeted Revenues by Type



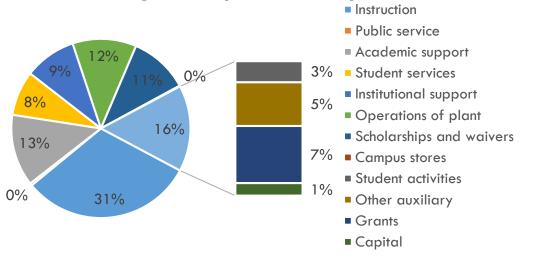
EXPENSE DASHBOARD DECEMBER 2020







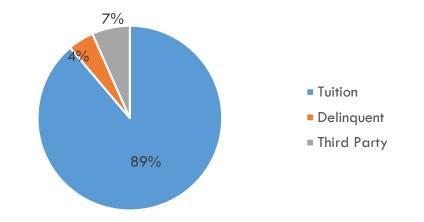
YTD Budgeted Expenditures by Function



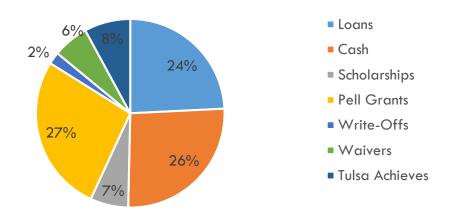
