FACILITIES & SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT

Presented by Regent McKamey

1. Overview of Committee Meeting Topics

Regent McKamey apprised the board of meeting topics discussed in the committee meeting on September 10, 2020.

- A Deferred Maintenance Assessment was presented by Sightlines. The Facilities team was provided a ranked list of initiatives based on need as budget is made available.
- The West Campus Hardesty Student Success Center is open offering new areas for advising, testing, bursar, computer resources, a mini-market, and laid out to adhere to physical distancing guidelines.
- The Major Projects and Facilities Dashboard Update was presented by Michael Siftar, Associate Vice President of Administrative Operations and CTO
 - o The Northeast Campus Student Success Center is the next major project.
 - o Currently prioritizing deferred maintenance projects.
 - COVID-19 retrofitting for spring semester will begin to take place pending the spring class schedule.

2. COVID-19 Update

Presented by Matt Sharpe, Director of Risk Management and Occupational Health and Safety

Mr. Sharpe explained the handout provided to the Board, which is also available on the College website.

- The College website will have a weekly COVID report that will include numbers from the previous week, as well as a chart or other information regarding year to date totals.
- Approximately 800-900 employees are working on-campus each week, and approximately 4,180 students are enrolled in in-person classes,.
- The handout shows the individuals who were on-campus before or around the time they were exposed to COVID-19, and shows individuals who were not oncampus before or around the time they were exposed to COVID-19.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS AND STUDENT SUCCESS COMMITTEE REPORT

Presented by Regent Combs

1. Overview of Committee Meeting Topics

Regent Combs apprised the board of meeting topics discussed in the committee meeting on September 10.

- Fall Enrollment Update
 - The College budgeted for less enrollment than previous year.
 Enrollment was better than anticipated, but still below what would be considered normal.
 - Continuing students were strong in enrollment.
 - o Tulsa Achieves outreach ongoing.
- TCC and the Tulsa Transfer Project
 - Ongoing progress on technology and user-friendly capabilities to assist students to map out their career path. TCC transfer website now live.

STUDENT SUCCESS UPDATE

Presented by Laura McNeese, Director of Career/Retention Programs, and Student, Lauren Ireland

1. Career Services Programming

- This summer, the department launched a new career exploration tool. TCC is the only institution in the state to participate in in a national cohort of firstgeneration student program, First to Finish.
- Ms. McNeese introduced student, Lauren Ireland. Ms. Ireland spoke before the Board of Regents about her experience in the First to Finish program. Career Services helped Ms. Ireland develop a resume and an online professional presence. Michael Harris in Career Services assisted Ms. Ireland with practice interviews for a summer internship in which she was subsequently hired.

FINANCE, RISK AND AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT

Presented by Regent Cornell

1. Purchase Item Agreements over \$50,000

1.1 Ratification for Software Licensing

Ratification was requested to for an agreement with <u>CDW, LLC (Vernon Hills, IL)</u> in the amount of \$60,549 to provide Adobe Licensing for the College on an annual basis. This agreement was negotiated by Oklahoma State University on behalf of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education. The amount listed is the College's share of the total cost. The purchase was funded from general budget.

A motion was made by the Finance, Risk & Audit Committee to approve the purchases ratification for software licensing. No second was needed. **Motion carried unanimously by voice vote.**

2. Monthly Financial Report for August 2020

Chief Financial Officer, Mark McMullen, presented an overview of August revenues, expenses, cash management and accounts receivables.

- Revenues: Ceding per budget due to better than expected enrollment.
- Expenses: Trending lower than budget. Anticipate instructional expenses to pick up throughout the semester. Deferred maintenance is budgeted if funds are available.

 Cash: Most cash used on capital projects and deferred maintenance. Will reassess after fall semester. Small deposits made every month; largest in January.

The Finance, Risk & Audit Committee recommended approval of the monthly financial report for August 2020 as presented.



The majority of TCC classes are online this semester and a large number of employees are working from home. This report only includes the employees that are working on-campus (approximately 800-900/week) and the (approximately 4180) students enrolled in in-person classes. We are only counting an individual once, regardless of the length of leave that may carry over from week to week.

Although TCC tracks this information to the best of our ability, it is based on self-reports of both contact and positive cases and is not independently verified. We strive to provide reports the week following, but may change the frequency of reports as needed.


