Tulsa Community College 2020-2021 Alumni Survey Report

April 11, 2022



Executive Summary

This report summarizes the results of the 2020-2021 Tulsa Community College Alumni Survey. The survey is designed to assess the employment and educational status of graduating students six months after their program completion and most recent experience at Tulsa Community College. The survey also provides a method for graduates to evaluate their educational experiences in the context of life (e.g., work, continuing education, personal life) after their award. The survey was distributed to 2,569 graduates and 153 were returned yielding a 6.0% response rate.

This report provides a summary of all survey responses received from 2020-2021 graduates. Detailed results and response frequencies for each survey item are also presented.

- 2,822 degrees and certificates were awarded to 2,569 individuals during the 2020-2021 academic year.
- The credentials awarded to graduates include university transfer degrees (AA & AS) and workforce development degrees (AAS) and certificates, with the following breakdown of awarded degrees:
 - 71.4% were a university transfer degree (AA or AS).
 - o 28.6% were a workforce development credential (AAS or certificate).
- Alumni were asked about their current educational objectives.
 - o 63.4% of the respondents are continuing their education.
 - o 25.5% plan to continue, but are not yet enrolled.
 - o 11.1% do not plan to continue their education.
- Respondents were asked about their current employment status.
 - o 73.6% of respondents indicated that they were employed. Of those reporting as employed:
 - 73.5% were employed full-time, 26.5% part-time.
 - 92.3% were employed in Tulsa or Northeast Oklahoma.
 - 65.8% were working either in their major field or in an area that is closely related to their field of study at TCC.
 - o Of the respondents who provided an estimate of their annual salary, 47.8% indicated an annual income of \$30,000 or more per year.

- Alumni were asked to indicate the extent their TCC experience contributed to their knowledge, skills, and personal development in specific areas. Following are the percentage of those indicating either Very much or Quite a bit for each area.
 - Written communication 72.7%
 - Oral communication 64.7%
 - Interpersonal interactions 60.7%
 - Critical thinking 78.0%
 - Problem solving 76.7%
 - Quantitative reasoning 70.7%
 - Teamwork or collaboration 69.3%
 - Personal responsibility 74.0%
 - Ethical decision making 70.0%
 - Diversity awareness 70.0%
 - Civic responsibility 67.3%
- Alumni were asked to rate the quality of their relationships with various groups while at TCC. Following is the percentage of those indicating either Excellent or Good for each group.
 - Other students 92.0%
 - o Instructors 89.3%
 - Administrators and staff from TCC offices 83.3%
- ❖ Alumni were asked to rate the quality of their educational experience at TCC.
 - o 62.0% indicated they were **Very satisfied** with the overall educational experience at TCC.
 - 52.7% indicated they would definitely enroll at TCC if they were starting college again.
 - 68.0% indicated they would **definitely** recommend TCC to others.
 - 48.0% characterized the preparation received at TCC for further study at another college or university as either Exceptional or Better than adequate.
 - o 41.3% characterized the preparation received at TCC for employment in their major field as either **Exceptional** or **Better than adequate**.
- Of the Alumni respondents, 82.0% indicated they had attended another college. Of those who had attended another college, 87.0% indicated the quality of education offered at TCC was **Better** than or **About the Same** as they received elsewhere.
- ❖ The comparison of the average response to scaled items between the 2020-2021 survey and the 2019-2020 showed only slight variations from year to year.

Method

Students were offered an incentive to participate consisting of a chance to win one of four \$50 Amazon gift cards provided by the Tulsa Community College Foundation. Reminder emails were sent to students weekly including a mention of the gift card incentive provided by the TCC Foundation. All surveys were coded with a unique identifier that served as a link between the survey responses and Banner system data for the purpose of reporting. In addition, the index was used for the gift card drawings at the close of the survey cycle. A total of 153 survey responses were collected representing a 6.0% respons rate. For comparison, the 2019-2020 Alumni Survey response rate was 12.9%.

All responses from the 2020 - 2021 Academic Year (Summer 2020, Fall 2020, Spring 2021) were aggregated for this report.

Survey Results

Although 153 surveys were returned, some respondents did not complete all survey items. The tables below report the number (N) and percentage (%) of responses for each item on the survey.

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Comments concerning faculty and staff of a positive nature (6)*

Comments concerning faculty and staff of a negative nature (5)*

XXXX** should not be allowed to continue teaching classes the way she currently teaches. She withholds grades and pads her test scores at the end, adding in fake extra credit points to help people pass at the end. This is a poor teaching technique and many students miss out on better learning experiences and opportunities due to this misinformation throughout a semester.

The advising staff could potentially help students more so than they are now. To register for the next semester you have to meet with an advisor to get the hold removed. The majority of the time I didn't know what classes to take or which direction to go in because it seemed like the advisor just needed to see my face and that was good enough to drop the hold. (It is like students have to have every question thought of before meeting with the advisor, no real addition help was provided for me at least). And I do understand there was possibly low staff and a lot of students to meet with but more accurate appointment times or the availability to make appointments online would be majorly beneficial to helping students succeed. As well as this I attended TCC concurrently throughout junior and senior year of high school then continued for a year and a half to finish my associates at TCC so I observed this happened over three years and no real change other than remodeling was done to the advising section. In comparison, at OSU, I have met with the same advisor every time I needed to. I made an appointment in my own time online and my advisor is only ever 5-10 minutes late. When meeting I always have a few questions but then my advisor answers them and asks me additional questions I may not have considered to further help me understand my career, enrollment process, and the overall path I am going down in life. She knows that I have a boyfriend, that my living situation doesn't make me super happy, and has discussed my current grades with me (alternatively, I almost never met with the same advisor twice due to the amount of appointments and lack of staff availability so the introduction part was continuous and no advisor actually got to know me other than my name and major when it was in front of them.) I recommend TCC to all of my younger friends due to me having no student debt solely due to TCC, this is an amazing school but the advising could be improved a tiny bit!

They say ask questions. No one really does that. Advisers and counselors all say different things about policies. They do not know what is going on and they work at the college

Consistently having to check with an advisor every semester was annoying while working full time. I am happy that I can still use the library and resources. I am unhappy that I cannot view previous courses in my major on blackboard to reference previous work.

Some professors take power to their heads. Teachers are allowed to do what they want without any checks and balances. The science and nursing instructors speak to you however they would like. Teachers make their own rules and then tell them they have a degree to do so. The morale in the nursing program is low amongst the students. Instructors say negative comments. Instructors focus on the wrong thing. Professors go out of their way to make things less convenient to the students. At clinical at Saint Francis students are instructed to drive to the South East Campus to debrief, to accommodate the professor. Professor doesnt take in the account for gas or time being wasted for the students.

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Comments concerning programs or instruction of a positive nature (2)*

Thank you to all the nursing educators for helping me achieve my goal in getting my nursing degree. Also thankful for my pre requisite instructors for helping me achieve my goal as well.

When I look back at what TCC taught me, I think that Comp I and Comp II were the most helpful in improving my writing skills and my analytical skills. Those skills are truly utilized as students progress in their academic endeavors.

Comments concerning programs or instruction of a negative nature (8)*

Horrible nursing program

I was surprised to find out in my allied health program that some of the instructors would be so unhelpful, unsupportive, and even downright negative and harsh toward students, just treating them like another number or like cattle that they move in and out every 2 years. I expected a much more positive experience and learning environment with teachers who are willing to listen and help, or instructors who actually encourage or have positive things to say to their students.

Your instructors have no clue of how to conduct an online course.

I should have graduated TCC with not only my associates degree but also a specific certificate from a CAD program such as autoCAD or Solidworks that proves beyond my degree that I'm qualified in a specific area of CAD.

Instead i had instructors who had minimum understanding of the programs and wasted time on classes that i could have spent learning the program (such as 2 semesters of drawing by hand).

Also, a teacher should not tell me to watch a YouTube video to learn more about the class I'm in. Nor should they ever ask me to follow them on social media.

Database is not emphasized in the IT programming classes, and programming in the cloud is not covered at all. That cost me many job opportunities as a software developer because the interviewers kept asking about that and said database was required and Cloud was important. The IT department started making a lot of programming courses online only. That seriously hurt my ability to learn, and I was no longer able to interact with the teachers to learn little things that the teachers didn't really intend to teach but that automatically came across just from the interaction. The IT department also eliminated the programming labs at all campuses, so programming students couldn't get help anywhere. They said we could go to the library to use the computers, but they didn't even have the software we needed to do our programming homework, and the people in the library knew nothing about programming, so there was no one to help us. I know several students who dropped out of the IT program because they didn't own their own computer, and they could no longer do their work on a school computer as they used to in the IT labs. If I had known that most programming classes would become online only and the IT labs would be closed, I would not have chosen TCC, and I certainly can't recommend it for any future IT students! They had to do that temporarily because of COVID, but they decided to make those changes permanent since they saw how much money it saved, and they are obviously more interested in money than in students!

As a student at TCC I enjoy the online classes, unfortunately the choices have become limited over the years.
